Venus, the "younger sister" of the Earth, is a little smaller than our planet - its diameter is 12104 kilometers and is the second planet in order from the Sun. The geological structure of this planet most probably resembles Earth's. However, the dense layer of clouds made us know little about this planet until the 1960s.

Earth. Color: Blue mixed with green, yellow, white, and brown Earth is a terrestrial planet with an atmosphere rich in nitrogen and oxygen. Blue light scatters more because of the oceans and atmosphere. Water absorbs red light, giving Earth its mostly blue appearance, often called The Blue Marble.. Beyond the dominant blue color, we see clouds and areas of ...

Size of the Planets. Our solar system comprises eight planets, which fall into two categories: the smaller, rocky inner planets (Mercury, Venus, Earth, and Mars) and the larger, gas giants (Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, and Neptune). Another name for the gas giants is the Jovian planets, for their similarity to Jupiter.

There are eight planets in the solar system, excluding dwarf planets like Pluto and large moons. Astronomers predict the presence of a ninth planet. The Milky Way galaxy contains an estimated 100 billion planets.

The largest objects that orbit the Sun are the eight planets. In order from the Sun, they are four terrestrial planets (Mercury, Venus, Earth and Mars); two gas giants (Jupiter and Saturn); and two ice giants (Uranus and Neptune). All terrestrial planets have solid surfaces.
