Human Toxicity from Damage and Deterioration. Before lithium-ion batteries even reach landfills, they already pose a toxic threat. When damaged, these rechargeable batteries can release fine particles--known as PM10 and PM2.5--into the air. These tiny particles, less than 10 and 2.5 microns in size, are especially dangerous because they carry metals like arsenic, ...

The taped battery can then be stored in a plastic bucket until taken to a recycler or placed in the household trash for disposal. Li-ion batteries contain some materials such as cobalt and lithium that are considered critical minerals and require energy to mine and manufacture. When a battery is thrown away, we lose those resources outright--they can never be recovered. Recycling the batteries avoids air and water pollution, as well as greenhouse gas emissions.

For this reason, you can't throw away lithium batteries either in the trash or in a recycling bin. To minimize the risk of fire and the introduction of hazardous chemicals into the environment, lithium batteries can be taken to a hazardous waste collection point or recycled at a recycling center. Alkaline batteries are single-use batteries that can't be recharged.
